 - a. The mission of this agency is as follows: Stark County Family Court promotes a safe and healthy community by protecting and supporting children and families.
 - b. The underlying goal of the agency is to do what you can to keep families intact and they work hard to rehabilitate rather than punish when at all possible.
 - c. She is a native of Newark, Ohio and was educated at Walsh University and the University of Akron Law School.
 - d. Judge Hall is one of three judges in Family Court and they are assisted by six magistrates. They handle about 1,300 trials per year.
 - e. Family Court consists of the following divisions:

Juvenile Court Division (criminals under the age of 18; paternity and child support; child abuse and neglect, unruly youth) Domestic Relations (divorce and dissolution; domestic violence; paternity & custody)

Teen Court (peer review, real cases, real trials, funded by United Way)

Meeting Notes -Wednesday, January 18, 2012

- 1. Gathering Approximately 31 in attendance with 3 visitors.
- 2. Tour of the new Louisville Elementary School
- a. The new elementary school was designed for kids. It is broken into 8 physically separate neighborhoods with each neighborhood containing 125 students. Students will be scheduled to move in groups of 125 to avoid all 1000 students in the hall at once. K, 1, 2, 3 are on the first floor and grades 4 and 5 are upstairs. K is separated and has its own playground.

- b. Each neighborhood has an extended learning location that allows for more group projects. Moveable walls can separate the classroom or create a larger space. Classrooms have projectors, wireless access points, digital whiteboards, and technology closets to accommodate the latest learning technology. Each classroom is designed for 25 students
- Special rooms were created for special needs children, music, and art.
- d. The building hangs from 28 columns due to the soft topography of the area. To meet funding specifications, there are several ogreen aspects to the building. It has motion sensor lights, natural lighting, chilled beam heating, refreshed air. There are 10 other elementary schools in Ohio that are as big. Fifty-two percent of funding was paid for by tobacco settlement money. Thirty percent of labor is local.
- e. Security has improved from current elementary schools. There are 80 security cameras, a central open stairwell, and entry supervision by administrators. There will be a segregated bus loop and all visitors will be required to go through the main doors.
- f. The elementary school features a competition-size gym, a two-sided stage, and a state-of-the-art stainless steel cafeteria with 4 lunch lines.
- g. Students will begin moving in after Presidents Day. Michelle Shaffer is the lead principal.

- 3. Prayer was led by Ted Burwell
- 4. Song Leader Eva Roshang led us in "Battle Hymn of the Republic"
- 5. Visitors Joel Soza, Dalia Soza
- 6. Rotary Minute James Wheeler Davidson,a Canadian Rotarian took a 3 year trip starting in 1928 to organize Rotary clubs in the Middle East & Asia. Paul Harris dubbed him the "Marco Polo" of Rotary as he chartered 21 Clubs.
- 7. Updates:
- a. The District Mid Year Assembly is scheduled for Feb 4 at AA Executive Catering in Canton. Registration will be available beginning at 7:30 AM. The breakfast buffet begins at 8 AM. Our meeting will begin at 8:30 and conclude no later than noon. Anyone with internet access can register for the assembly through the District's Club Runner site. They can also phone the District office at 330-452-2882 and register with Lauri Coy. The cost is \$7.50 per person, which we will collect at the door. Please note that reservations need to be made by 27 January, 2012.
- b. Kathryn will be attending RYLA in February. Any can contribute to a "goody bag" that will be distributed at the conference (promotional business items) Please bring them to our next meeting.
- c. Saturday January 28th, will mark the 35th anniv of the 1977 blizzard.
- 8. Program: Joel Soza, Associate Professor of Biblical Studies at Malone University.
- a. Joel wrote a book, "Food and GOD" while on sabbatical. He wanted a practical topic and began to think about food while he was eating a Big Mac. He realized that humans eat every day but often give little thought to what they are eating or how it affects the environment. This is the definition of a glutton.
- b. Joel's book is not a diet book, but a call to spiritual action and theological perspective on food. The main theme is "think before you eat" Food is a gift from God, as illustrated by Genesis: food existed before the creation of humans. Further, the fall of human kind centered on food.
- c. Many church theologians discuss food. St. Augustine in his book "Confessions" dedicates Chapter 31 to gluttony. This chapter equates gluttony with lust. Other theologians poured ashes over their food so they would not enjoy it as much. The "Golden Tongue Priest" equated an increase in food to and increase in excrement.
- d. Gregory the Great devised the seven deadly sins. Gluttony earns one a spot in the 3rd circle of hell and is represented by pigs and the color orange. Gregory indicates there are five ways one practices gluttony: eating too soon, too delicately, too expensive, too greedily, and too much. All these center on not thinking of those that don't have food, but rather filling up the stomach. Joel referenced a book, "Faith and Fitness" that challenges individuals to "feed mentally" and concentrate on service of others instead of self.
- e. Humans dine, animals feed. Christianity developed and spread by around the table fellowship and breaking of bread with neighbors.
- f. Joel is concerned that as individuals/households/nation we are giving away our future because we are gluttons and

concentrating on filling up our own stomachs, much like the story of Esau.

- Program & Betty Derry introduced Louisville native Carolyn Hess who discussed a county-wide program that she coordinates called Because We Care. Highlights of Ms. Hess s program are as follows:
 - **Because We Care** is based at the Christ Presbyterian Church in downtown Canton.
 - 2) The mission of Because We Care is to provide basic personal care items to Stark County Military Personnel, those deployed or currently in a military hospital.
 - 3) Bases in Afghanistan frequently do not have Post Exchanges or PX s. Consequently, troops must rely on families to ship much needed items.
 - The following personal care items are needed: Visine, Shampoo, Deodorant, Baby Wipes, Pop Tarts, Beef Jerky, Gum, Candy, Pop Corn, etc. No glass bottles are permitted and candy & cookies must be in a sealed package.
 - Because We Care is currently providing personal care products to about 100 residents of Stark County.
 - 6) The greatest need at this time is for funds to ship these much-needed health care products to our sons and daughters now stationed in Afghanistan.
 - The current cost to ship a small box to a stateside soldier is \$5.35 per box while a large box to a soldier in Afghanistan costs \$11.35 per box.

- **Rotary Minute** Ron Derry: Article from March *Rotarian* talks of a gentleman going to the Royal College of Art in London to learn how to cast bronze through an Ambassadorial Scholarship from Rotary. This scholarship allows undergraduates through professionals to be goodwill ambassadors and present their culture to local Rotary Clubs. Over 532 million dollars have been awarded, but in 2013, this scholarship will be available through the District to allow for more flexibility.

6. Updates

- a. Al Gress is writing an article on our exchange student, Julia. He asked her what she delike to leave behind when she leaves in July. She replied that she hopes people have learned about France and have come to understand that there are a lot of similarities between the French and Americans.

- d. On February 23rd, there is a winter band concert at 7pm at the high school.
- e. The Historical Society s next talk is on Louisville: The way it was 60 years ago and is presented by Al Gress and Ron Derry.
- f. On March 14th, judging of the Four-Way Speech Contest will occur at the high school at 3:30 pm.
- 7. Congratulations to our newest members, Maranda Saling and Steve Roberts.
- 8. Program Rich McElroy
- a. Rich is a retired professor from Mount Union and Malone University, but he has taught grades 5 senior in college. He stores all of his classroom records, has written 12 books, and received many awards.
- b. He mentioned two students. Ann from Aurora was an 82-year-old widow and Indianapolis Colts Pierre Garcon (who emailed his homework during playoffs).
- c. Rich mentioned many interesting tidbits that happened in history on February 22nd. In 1847, Zachary Taylor was outnumbered 4:1 in the Mexican War, but he said he would not surrender. This was a turning point in the war. In 1924, Calvin Coolidge made the first radio broadcast from the White House. In 1732, George Washington was born. In 1987, Andy Warhol died. In 2002, Chuck Jones (Bugs Bunny, etc. creator) died.
- d. Rich provided two polls of presidential ratings. The 2007 Gallop Poll ranked top presidents as: 1. Lincoln, 2. Reagan, 3. JKF, 4. Clinton,
- 5. FDR, 6. Washington, 7. Truman, 8. GW Bush, 9. T. Roosevelt. Around the same time, CSPAN released a poll of historian stop presidents: 1. Lincoln, 2. FDR, 3. Washington, 4. T. Roosevelt, 5. Truman, 6. Wilson, 7. Jefferson, 8. JFK, 9. Eisenhower, 10. LBJ. The worst presidents typically do not change in rankings: A. Johnson, Grant, Harding, Buchanan, and Pierce.
- e. Rich spent 9 years talking to descendants of presidents. He shared a dozen short anecdotes from his book.
- 1. President and First Lady Coolidge were touring a farm in Virginia on separate tours. The First Lady asked how many times the roosters procreated in a day. The response was a dozen times. She asked him to tell the President that. When Coolidge heard this, he asked if it was the same hen every time. The response was a different one every time. He asked him to tell the First Lady that.
- 2. Washington sent a general to requisition horses from farms for the war. The general went to a farm with an old widow and asks for her horses on order from George Washington. She replies, go tell him that he can that have his Mom so horses.
- 3. In 1858, Lincoln was doing a town hall meeting when a gentleman exclaimed, I wouldnot vote for you if you were St. Peter himself. Lincoln replied that if he were St. Peter, the gentleman would not be in his district.
- 4. Taft visited a Southern orphanage. The orphanage chose a 6-year-old boy to give a gift to the President. Upon doing so, Taft said,
- ♦ What a beautiful little girl. ♦ The little boy replied, ♦ I ain ♦ t no girl you damn fool. ♦

- a. The mission of this program is �� Offering a safe and secure environment for older adults in need of supervision or assistance with activities of daily living while family caregivers are at work or attending to other responsibilities. �� The program tries very hard to �� keep people high-functioning for a long time. ��
- b. This program has been developed by Catholic Charities and is funded in part as follows: Client payments, United Way, Veterans Administration, etc.
- c. Those clients who have difficulty paying for this service are eligible to receive Family Respite Funds.
- d. Current enrollment at the Day Care program is 10-15 and they are now accepting applications for other clients.
- e. Cost is \$45.00 for the full day and \$35.00 for half a day of service. These fees cover a wholesome breakfast, lunch, and an afternoon snack.
- f. Hours are from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- g. The age of the current clients is 80-85 years.
- g. No transportation if provided at this time.
- h. There are highly skilled and dedicated staff available, including a Registered Nurse, a Social Worker, etc.
- i. Medicare does not cover Adult Day service but some medical insurers do.
- j. Programming is age appropriate and varies from gardening, to playing cards, singing, reminiscing, etc.

- 1. Gathering Meeting called to order by President Burwell with 26 (of 46) members in attendance.

- a. Four-Way Speech Contest is today at 3:30.
- b. If you have program ideas, please forward to Eva Roshong.
- c. Jim Edwards provided an update on the Donations Committee. They will meet next Wednesday at 11:15 and would appreciate some quiet so they can focus. Jay Barton provided a proposal, which sets the budget at \$10,400 and allocates 30% to national programs, 5 grants, and \$200 per month for miscellaneous causes.
- 7. Program: Pat Smith Recognizing Child Abuse

- Every case of child abuse is different � there is no checklist. Budget cuts have decreased programs focusing on child abuse. The State a. of Ohio requires teachers to recognize and report child abuse and neglect, but only up to a certain age. Teacher associations provide information for older children. It is difficult to have a child taken away from the family.
- There are five types of child abuse.
- i. Physical abuse: This goes beyond bruises and cuts. Early educators look for a cluster of wounds in different stages of healing � often on the underarms, bottom, soles of feet, palms. Soft signs include limping.
- Emotional abuse: Signs of this include sudden change in behavior (passive to aggressive). Soft signs include repeated absences on ii. Mondays (abuse takes place over the weekend) or bizarre behavior. Home schooling also makes it easy for abusers to not get caught.
- Sexual abuse: Any sexual connotation is abuse. 89% of victims know the attacker, including family members.
- Neglect: This mimics poverty and is an omission of an item. iv.
- Dependency: This is when the parent cannot take care of the child due to personal development issues. v.
- Stress is the number one cause of abuse. Societal stress and economic problems are causing an increase in abuse cases. Adults would c. rather turn on the child than admit they can tay ford what the child wants. Also, violent video games desensitize children to violence, which makes them more likely to imitate or accept abuse.
- Domestic violence creates another type of abuse. The child goes to bed without knowing if Mom or Dad will be alive when they wake up.
- When children are not raised in a good environment, it is hard to have good results. Studies show that if children are not nurtured adequately, there are gaps in brain activity, especially in the temporal lobe. If the child has proper nutrition, sleep, and love they will have a better-wired brain.
- Pat is a member of Pinwheels for Protection they post a pinwheel for every reported case of child abuse. Last year Stark County had 2703 child abuse cases. (Franklin County 8700, Summit 5700, and Cuyahoga 18000).
- Budget cuts and inadequate laws have prevented more success at child abuse prevention and awareness. In the past, every reported case had to be investigated but now it is not mandatory. Also, anonymous reports are not accepted after 4pm. Ohio Law defines child abuse as having two victims instead of a victim (child) and abuser (adult). The case is worked through with the family intact. Teachers used to be mandatory reporters, but now they are only mandatory on the clock.
